Something Is Rotten in the State of South Gloucestershire

An odd thing popped up on the South Gloucestershire website on 29th July. A statutory notice appeared informing the public of South Gloucestershire Council's intention to "appropriate" and "dispose of" an area of land at Oaktree Avenue in Pucklechurch. You probably guessed it: the land is the very same area subject to an approved planning application to build housing and a doctor's surgery and also subject to a recent application to become a village green.

What does "appropriation and disposal" mean? It means that SGC will sell the land to Sovereign Housing Association for the development of housing units and Three Shires Medical Practice for a new surgery. The price paid to SGC will cover only a third of the units built by Sovereign – the third that they can sell at market prices (as opposed to the one-third social housing and one-third affordable housing that makes up the rest of the development).

The timing of this consultation – from 29th July to 26th August – seems rather suspicious. It not only coincided with the summer holidays when many people who might object were away but, more to the point, the time when Andrew Griffiths, the person named on the website as the one to whom questions should be directed, was away. This led to a delay of two weeks in answering the questions put to him by Pucklechurch Parish Council.

The appropriation and disposal consultation closed on August 26th, ten days before the date of the public inquiry on the village green application on 6th September. When asked by the Parish Council what would happen if the land was disposed of before a decision was made about village green status, Mr Griffiths indicated that recent case law may permit development to go ahead even if the land is subsequently registered as a village green, though he says they will wait for the inspector's report following the public inquiry.

At their August 17th meeting, Pucklechurch Parish Council decided to support the village green application. The Parish Council believes that SGC authorities have consistently sidelined them on the Oaktree development plans. Instead of treating our Parish Council as a partner in this village's development, they have given them the minimum information and input required by law.



Housing or open space? That is the question.

The planning application that was approved in March was another example of SGC's tactics. What appeared to be an outline planning application was, in fact, a full planning application for 56 houses and an outline application for the surgery – a so-called hybrid application. (See Martin Smith's letter in the spring issue of *Pucklechurch News*.) The title fooled everyone into thinking that there would be a subsequent full application to which more detailed objections could be made.

What does all this mean for the new surgery? SGC has always resisted separating the application for the new surgery from the housing development application, presumably because most villagers want a new surgery but do not want 56 houses on the Oaktree land. The surgery sweetens the deal. There is no reason that Pucklechurch couldn't have both a registered village green and a doctor's surgery on the Oaktree land. SGC could easily make this happen.

I spoke to Dr John Seddon at the Pucklechurch Surgery, who believes that Three Shires Medical Practice has also been left out of the loop in SGC's plans. "It has been four years since the Council agreed to sell the land on Oaktree Avenue to us," says Dr Seddon, "but we get very little information on what is happening with our application. It's very frustrating." The practice has agreed a price for the land with SGC, as well as for the privately owned strip needed for access, but still the process drags on.

By the time you read this, SGC may or may not have "disposed of" the land, and the village green application may or may not have been successful. The point is: do we, the residents of Pucklechurch and our Parish Council, have the right to fair and transparent planning process from South Gloucestershire Council? Is this what we have received?

HeartStart Pucklechurch

As many of you will have noticed, our first defibrillator is in place on the front outside wall of the Community Centre. We would like to thank both Pucklechurch Parish Council for their generosity in sponsoring the cost of the defibrillator and the PCA Committee and Social Club for funding the installation.

We are delighted to report that the HeartStart campaign is progressing well, and we should soon have enough money for our next defibrillator. We hope to place this on the outside wall of Pucklechurch Village Sports and Social Club on St Aldam's Drive. This defibrillator will serve the Homefield Centre, nearby houses and the industrial estate.

Our 50:50 Challenge – getting 50 groups or people to donate £50 each – has been progressing steadily. We have already received 25 donations or pledges from organisations and individuals. These will take time to filter through, as many are undertaking various ways of raising the money. If you have made a pledge and do not need time to raise the money, we would be very grateful for the donations as soon as possible, as money in the bank means another defibrillator. And we still need another 25 donors!

The Revel Beer Festival Committee gave us the opportunity to run the raffle, and over the two evenings, we raised the fantastic amount of £700.

Despite the weather, Revel Day was also successful. We displayed a defibrillator, and with donations and the Find-the-Heart game, we raised another £100. Thanks to all who supported us.

We have placed a fundraising thermometer on the gates of the old chapel site in the centre of the village. We have now raised $\pounds 4,000$ in total, so we are well on our way to the second defibrillator. The Pucklechurch website will have regular updates on our progress.

Tina and Maggie, committee members trained in resuscitation, are offering basic life support awareness sessions to people from organisations and groups who would like to improve their knowledge in this area. I personally would like to thank members of the HeartStart committee for all their support over the past few months for their work in getting the project up and running and you, the public, for making this possible.

I was going to report that the Community Centre was very quiet during the month of August, but then I popped in on Thursday and there SureStart and the Pucklechurch Majorettes were making noise and enjoying themselves. The building seemed to be so much more than bricks and mortar.

One of the questions the Community Plan tried to answer was "What makes a community?" Really, it's not one big thing, it's more to do with small things like meeting together before and after playgroup, Star Jumpers, or short mat bowls. The Community Centre is rarely empty. It does its job of being a regular meeting place, both formally and informally.

Despite some objections, the Pucklechurch Community Association has received retrospective planning permission for the Community Art to remain where it is. In other words, the Youth Club art work is legally entitled to remain in place.

To make such meetings more pleasant, the PCA and the Executive are improving the looks and safety of the building. We have installed emergency lighting and are getting quotes for a fire alarm system. We have been successful in obtaining grants for the building to be insulated and for the guttering on the field side to be replaced. Together with the Social Club, we have paid for the installation of the defibrillator by the front door (the Parish Council having paid for the equipment).

The only thing that we are short of is people who will come along once a month and help us to plan the future. If you have any ideas for the Community Centre, please come and join us.

Be On Your Guard

South Gloucestershire

to remind the residents of

their guard for three new



scams that have been brought to our attention.

Reports have been received of an increase in rogue traders travelling around the district touting for scrap metal. The details of the transactions remain unclear, but we would like to warn residents to be wary of unexpected callers and the deals they offer you. If you are in any doubt, refuse to deal with the caller.

Another recent con is a telephone-based scam. Residents have received calls received calls asking if they own a particularly well known brand of vacuum cleaner and giving the impression they are from that company. If the resident confirms they do, the caller goes on to offer a vacuum cleaner service for £24.99. When they arrive to carry out this service, however, they inflate this price considerably, sometimes claiming spare parts or further work are needed. If you receive such a call, be cautious. You may find you do not have automatic cancellation rights in this situation and you may feel pressured to pay the extra amounts.

A third scam involves residents being telephoned by sales staff, who then go on to worry pensioners into setting up an appointment with a rep about their concerns over the "ravages of the Community Care Act", offering to set up a family prosperity trust to avoid your house being sold to cover your care needs in later life. The sales staff exploit a scenario that is of great concern to pensioners and then arrange an agreement for a trust document to be drawn up to protect the resident – costing anything between £1000 and £3500. It is believed the document may not be as watertight as marketed, thus potentially leaving the householders' property still at risk to the very problem the trust is supposed to guard against. Cancellation rights are being given, but when residents cancel, victims are strung along and never get their money back. Trading Standards in this and other areas of the country are investigating.

Don't Be Scared When the Lights Go Out

Starting in September, some street lights in Pucklechurch will be switched off during the night between approximately midnight and 4.15am in the winter and between 1.00am and 5.15am (if still dark) during the summer (BST). The work will take place during the normal maintenance cycle.

Lights will remain on along Shortwood Road, Shortwood Hill, Main Road, Westerleigh Road, and Abson Road, as well as enclosed walkways and the underpass at Oaktree Avenue. A small number of other lights will remain on that meet specific SGC criteria.

Pucklechurch joins a list of villages that have already started the part-night switch-off. With over 4,000 lights now in the scheme, SGC report that no problems have been created by the switch-off.

The number of voters who registered online

More and more South Gloucestershire residents are registering to vote online, by phone, or by text. So far, 33,000 of you have registered in this way. And with the annual canvas starting next month, you could save time too by registering online.

Councillor John Goddard, Executive Member for Corporate Affairs, thanked residents who have already embraced this technology. "In 2010, only our second year of using online, telephone and text registration services, a massive 33,000 households – that's 30% – confirmed their household registration this way. Wednesdays are far and away the most popular day to use these services, with a third of electors making their return on this day of the week," he said. "South Glos residents are always at the forefront when it comes to using technology, and it's great to see that being put to use in electoral registration. The new methods of confirming registration are quicker and easier for electors to use, and they also save the council money, which is especially important in the current climate."

"About 109,000 households will be receiving their electoral registration forms over the next few weeks," added Goddard, "and I would encourage electors to try out the new registration methods wherever possible. Remember, the services are available 24/7, not just on Wednesdays!"

At the May meeting of the Bitton and Boyd Valley Safer Stronger Community Group, which was held in Pucklechurch, several issues relevant to the village were raised, and the outcomes of those matters are now available.

- A Speedwatch initiative is getting underway in Wick and Abson parish, and it may be mutually beneficial for it and our own Speedwatch group to collaborate, particularly regarding speeding on the road to and from Abson.
- Work continues on reinstating missing "Danger –
 Horseriders" road signs in the area. Some are already in
 place, and others are to follow.
- Parking on St Aldam's Drive and adjacent roads, particularly of HGVs, has been monitored on several occasions and at different times by the police. They report that, although they have seen inconsiderate parking, at no time have they seen parking that constitutes a danger, and thus they cannot take action.
- Following reports that a needle, presumably from drug taking, had been found at the Shortwood playground, the police have been monitoring the area, and have found no further evidence of drug use at that site.
- A request to increase the parking restrictions outside the Pucklechurch post office and local store, and generally around the T junction in the centre of the village, was passed to SGC Highways for their comment. Having inspected the site, Highways have reported back that they feel any further restriction would be likely to make the junction more dangerous, since the parked cars help to slow the traffic flow.
- The use of HGVs within Pucklechurch, primarily on the Westerleigh Road, but also on Abson Road and Feltham Road, is recognised as a problem by SGC. Consequently, they have initiated a reporting procedure in the hopes that, over time, the problem can be reduced through court action. Residents should report offenders directly on 0845 404 0506, and provide as much detail as possible, preferably including the date, time, and location of the HGV; the direction of travel, the vehicle registration, the make and model of vehicle, its colour, any identifying markings (e.g., company name, phone number), and any other useful information. In addition, there are moves afoot nationally to make the use of commercial satnay systems compulsory for HGVs. Currently many use the systems intended for use by private motorists, presumably because they are considerably cheaper, rather than the commercial ones, which include access restrictions for commercial traffic that are not shown on the cheaper ones.

Chairman's Report

This is my first report as Chairman of the new Parish Council, and I am pleased to say that we are bringing to fruition the work of the previous Council as well as undertaking exciting new initiatives.

The St Aldam's Play Garden is now open. Local children are delighted and having lots of fun on the new equipment. The Council has listened to some concerns raised by residents. By the time you read this, we hope to have developed a way forward that will please the village as a whole.

Parish councillors have been able to influence the cycleway infrastructure in South Gloucestershire by having the proposed link from Pucklechurch to the Avon cycleway included as part of their longer term project list. This may involve the compulsory purchase of land, hence we cannot be sure of the timescale. Work to create a cycle path to join Coxgrove Hill to Westerleigh and eventually to Yate is currently underway. It is worthy to note that the cycle path link from Pucklechurch was identified as a need in the Community Plan.

Plans for the new doctor's surgery have taken a step forward, and detailed discussions with South Gloucestershire Council are underway. The Parish Council has been fully supportive of the surgery going ahead, separate from any other development application, and has made representations to South Gloucestershire Council emphasising this point.

We have recently taken advantage of the offer of two substantial notice boards and are looking for suitable sites. This is in line with our intention of making communication between the Council and parish residents a key element of the way we will be conducting our business over the next four years. Better notice boards were also identified as a need in the Community Plan.

Earlier this year it came to the attention of one of our councillors that the North Bristol Trust had withdrawn — without any consultation — the local community ante-natal care, with all mums now having to go to Yate. This was followed up by the Parish Council with the full support of the local doctors. The matter has now been taken up by South Gloucestershire Local Involvement Network (LINk), the local health scrutiny organisation, demanding that explanations be given and that the service be reinstated. We will keep you informed as this matter progresses.

We are currently undergoing a co-option process as we were, at the time of writing, three councillors short. We look forward to the completion of the process and to welcoming the new councillors.

Earlier this year many Pucklechurch residents were kind enough to complete a survey on traffic in the village. Good Neighbour Scheme

The Pucklechurch and Shortwood Good Neighbour Scheme volunteers and coordinators met on the 12th May. The scheme is continuing to receive calls from members of the community. We have responded to around a dozen calls ranging from requests to help with re-tuning digital TV boxes, putting out bins to performing small gardening tasks. A number of volunteers have helped with these calls. We have also formed links with adult social care services in our area and are receiving referrals from them.

We will shortly be advertising our scheme through Well Aware, the Care Forum's information and signposting database of health, wellbeing, and community services in South Gloucestershire.


