Due to the generosity of the Parish Council, Revel, Cory Environmental Trust and South Glos. Environmental Trust, the Community Centre is totally wrapped up in insulation, the Kitchenette has a new carpet, the Changing Rooms a complete set of rain guttering and the air into and out of the Main Hall can now be refreshed at will. Some of these have been in the planning for nearly twelve months and have finally been completed. So as the Team sat back and thought what next the weather intervened and a large section of the ancient wall behind the stage end of the Centre collapsed, revealing the standard of craftsmanship of one hundred and fifty years ago! So back to the drawing board for more money. Talking of money, which we often do, George Hill has been doing the job for the last three years, and has handed in his

notice for the end of next year, 2013, as has the Chairman, Secretary and Vice Chairman. The up shot of these actions are that unless people volunteer for these posts, preferable now, to shadow them for a year, the Community Centre will close the day after the next AGM. Does Pucklechurch Need a New Village Community Centre Summary Results

Thank you to everyone who took part in our survey there were 133 responses in total comprising 46 submissions on paper and 87 online. A full break down of the results can be found at <u>www.pucklechurch.org</u>.

 91.6% of respondents agreed with the following statement:
 "Pucklechurch deserves a facility that can really

become the focus of community life, that caters to the needs and interests of everyone in the parish and which is able to offer sporting, leisure and social activities in a flexible way."

- 2. 77.5% of respondents agreed that in its current form Pucklechurch Village Community Centre is unable to meet the needs of the wider local community.
- 3. 88.6% of respondents agreed that a new or improved facility could have the potential to improve the experience of living in and around Pucklechurch.
- 61.2% of respondents said they are current users or members of a group that regularly uses Pucklechurch Village Community Centre.
- 5. 81.7% of respondents who said they were not a regular user would like to be if suitable facilities were provided. (Some suggestions were offered).
- 6. A variety of free text answers were given explaining what stopped non-regular users utilising the Community Centre. In summary these included lack of time or interest, lack of suitable facilities/size of rooms/appropriate groups, as well as the overall look and feel of the building. Some respondents articulated why they felt redevelopment was unnecessary but these were in a minority.
- 87.7% of respondents agreed that Pucklechurch Parish Council should facilitate the planning and redevelopment of the Community Centre.
- 8. 88% of respondents live in Pucklechurch village.
- More women than men answered the questionnaire and most people who replied fell in to the age bracket between 25 and 59 although responses were received across a range from 11 85+ years.

At the time of writing Pucklechurch Parish Council were intending to discuss these results at the next available full council meeting on 16^{th} May 2012. Any decisions taken as a result of this discussion will be published in due course.

Pucklechurch Good Neighbour Scheme

The Good Neighbours are continuing to help people within our community by putting bins out, doing small gardening tasks and by spending time with people.

We have been successful in our application to South Gloucestershire Council's Small Grants Fund. This means we have funds to pay for a further year's Public Liability insurance and renew our volunteers' CRB checks, which is something that should be done every three years. We have also applied for funding to the Parish Council as we need ongoing Public Liability insurance and would like to be able to produce leaflets to advertise the scheme. This will secure the future of the scheme for Pucklechurch and Shortwood residents.

Pucklechurch Parish Council Chairmans Report

Can we win CPRE Avonside Village of the Year?

We participate in this competition every year but this time we really believe we have a good chance of winning. The judges will be looking to make awards based on the standard of care, tidiness and absence of litter in villages rather than 'picturesque' displays. Our parish is now kept to a much higher standard of cleanliness, thanks to the hard work of our parish orderly Jo, as well as by Anna Sharpe who takes care of litter for us on the Rec. Since introducing the new Parish Council mobile text messaging number - 07950081307 - we have also been able to report instances of litter and fly tipping that have been notified to us more efficiently, so cleanliness should not be a problem!

We do still need your help though. We need you to help us by looking at our village through the eyes of a competition judge and if you spot a problem to either inform us of it via text so we can put things right or, if possible and it is simple and safe to do so, by putting it right yourself. Also, have you visited the Woodlands or Skate Park along the Westerleigh Rd. recently? As the longer days are with us it would be worth a visit for walking, picnics or just to play. Your feedback on those areas would also be appreciated as we might be able to make them more attractive With regard to updates from my report in the last issue:

- I can confirm that the Parish boundary is under review as part of a South Gloucestershire Council Community Governance Review - as soon as more information becomes available it will posted on our community website at www.pucklechurch.org
- The recycling bin for plastics should now be in place.
- The Parish Council continues its walk-in 'surgery' on the first Saturday of the month please drop by with any issues you have or just to say hello.
- Responses from the Pucklechurch Village Community Centre Survey have been received and collated - a summary can be found in this edition of Pucklechurch News. By the time you read these they will also have been discussed at the Full Parish Council in May and any decisions taken on them reported as soon as possible. I can confirm that the Council does not have £3 million pounds to spend on this; the figure was an estimate of the potential level of funding required.

Other items to note:

- We have reviewed the cost of burials in the Parish as they had not been reviewed for a number of years, they are now in line with surrounding parishes
- Our approach to next year's Annual Parish Cleanup will be reviewed as this year we attracted only one participant - my thanks go to that gentleman.
- An application to build a house on the former Congregational Chapel site has been made - at the time of writing no decision had been made by South Gloucestershire Council planners as to whether or not this should be approved.

Access to our countryside

A group of people interested in making the wonderful countryside around our village more accessible met in the Community Centre on the 30th April.

We were very fortunate to have a talk by John Grimshaw, founder of SUSTRANS, on the extension of the Bristol-Bath Railway Path. The extension will run from the bottom of Coxgrove Hill to Yate. The first phase will get as far as Westerleigh Road and will be open for walkers and mountain bikes in the next month. The path will be compacted and cyclists will be able to use it from August. The final hard surface will be put down next year and at it is then hoped that horse riders will be able to use it as well. The team doing the work are looking for volunteers to help so please take a look at call for volunteers in this edition of *Pucklechurch News*.

We also heard from local villager Matt Skidmore who is on the steering group for a project called the Two Tunnels Greenway which will link to the Bristol-Bath Railway Path and provide a route south from Bath via two tunnels and a viaduct to Midford. Matt's experience will be a valuable asset for Pucklechurch.

The meeting went on to discuss the current situation with regards to a path from Pucklechurch to Shortwood. Although this is on the task register at SGC no progress is being made. This path was identified as having considerable support from the community in our Community Plan. Our Boyd Valley councillor, Steve Reade is asking SGC to carry out a feasibility study as soon as possible and also to look into splitting the work into sections so that budget can be found more readily. Pucklechurch Parish Council has requested that SGC go ahead with the land acquisition as soon as possible as this is often something that delays projects. We will keep you posted on developments.

After a review of the current situation with footpaths, cycle tracks and bridleways the meeting went on to discuss how access to the rural footpaths could be improved. A number of people will be meeting soon to identify routes and to draw up plans on how access to these paths will be made easier for the community. Amongst the items discussed were better signs and printed leaflets for various routes.

Unfortunately the horse riding community were only represented by one person, so come on horse riders, get involved!

Volunteers Needed

Pucklechurch to Westerleigh extension to the Railway Path

You may have noticed that work has started on the railway path from Coxgrove Hill, through to and under the motorway and then right up to the Westerleigh Road at Kidney Hill. This project to extend to Yate was first drawn up in 1982 so it's good to see it started at last.

South Gloucestershire hope to construct 3kms of new path over the summer, and they anticipate having the budget to do it provided we can support them with voluntary work, (either at weekends or for a week long work camp).

The work will involve hauling materials in a dumper, spreading by hand tools, rolling with a vibrating machine, edging, fencing and some carpentry for wooden seats. As well as people who would like to try their hands at this we need help with feeding the workforce. Volunteers coming from a distance will also need accommodation.

'Wood' you 'twig' it was a scam?

South Gloucestershire Trading Standards would like to advise residents to be wary of those visiting unexpectedly and offering goods or services.

Trading Standards have been alerted to a new approach on the old 'rogue trader' tactics. A resident of South Gloucestershire reported that a man driving a pick up truck pulling a trailer pulled onto the driveway of her rural home offering to sell logs. He became quite pushy and aggressive with the resident.

Incidents such as these can be linked to distraction burglaries and in this case the rogue trader may have been attempting to check out rural properties with outbuildings.

There are a number of steps residents can take to try and avoid becoming the victim of a rogue trader.

- Be wary of traders who cold call and the deals they offer you they may have alternative motives for being at your door.
- Do not allow any unknown and/or unexpected visitors into your home.
- If you are unhappy or feel intimidated by the visitor shut the door and call the police.

If you believe you have fallen victim to a rogue trader please contact the Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 08454 04 05 06, who will then refer the details to Trading Standards. All, and any, information about these types of incidences can prove invaluable in the fight against rogue traders.
