An application was made for listed building status for the WWII barrage balloon mooring in the middle of the proposed development site. An initial report on the feature has been completed by English Heritage, and the mooring site has become a listed feature. This has had an impact on the layout of the development and Sovereign Housing Group has had to redesign the plans. Play Park and Activity Area

In the last edition of *Pucklechurch News*, I wrote that the funding for the new children's activity area had been ring-fenced and that work would begin in the near future. Since then, however, the new Government has announced that many projects would have their funding frozen. At present we have had no definitive answer from SGC about our project, but we are hopeful that, at the very least, a scaled-down design may be built.

Village of the Year

Although we always participate in the Village of the Year challenge, we have recently been unable to achieve the success we had a few years ago. There are unkempt and untidy areas in the village that no one seems to own, together with large amounts of litter on our open spaces, despite the best efforts of Anne Sharpe and others. Council will be looking to organise more village clean-ups in addition to the "Spring Clean" we have around Easter each year.

Facts:

- Currently 95% of sudden cardiac arrest victims die before reaching the hospital due to the length of time it takes for paramedics to arrive on the scene.
- The only effective way to treat sudden cardiac arrest is with an electrical shock delivered by a defibrillator.
- For every minute that a person in sudden cardiac arrest waits to be defibrillated, their chance of survival decreases by 10%.
- After 10 minutes, the chance of survival is below 10%.
- A defibrillator can get a person's heart started again after a cardiac arrest, and medics say it can increase a person's chances of survival by up to 74%.

Solution:

 Acquire a defibrillator for the village so it can be deployed as quickly as possible.

Some villages (such as Ambaston in Derbyshire and Napton in Warwickshire) have installed local defibrillators. They are also in use in some public places, such as shopping malls. I am very keen to see a defibrillator in Pucklechurch and have already enlisted support from the local GP surgery and the Parish Council.

Next Step:

I would like a small group of people who are interested to join me to spearhead this project. My aim is to hold a meeting sometime after Christmas to discuss and plan the way forward. You may have received a variety of charity collection bags through your letterbox in the past year. They come from numerous different charities and request all sorts of donations, promising to collect the full bag from your doorstep on a particular day of the week.

For the past 20+ years there has been an NSPCC fund-raising committee meeting in Pucklechurch, and thanks to the generosity of many villagers, we have raised well over £100,000 in this time. When bags carrying the NSPCC logo started to appear on the doormat, we asked questions about how much benefit NSPCC gains from the proceeds. It seems that the collection is not run by the charity but by an agent, and the NSPCC gets a percentage of the money received from recycling the contents of the bags. Staff at NSPCC have reassured us that the collections are legitimate and the contractor has pledged to raise £2.3 million through these collections nationwide over three years. We are sorry to hear that some people have put bags out only to find that they are not collected, but as a local committee, we are unable to influence the contractor.

Be aware that the donations collected in this way are not sold in a shop (NSPCC has no shops) but shredded for recycling into paper and so forth. So it is not advisable to put good quality clothes into the bag – they won't be going to a good home!

Wow! Thank you to all the people who donated apples to the cider project. A small band of volunteers, including Tony Humphrey, Pete Dix, John Sexton, and Lyn Smith helped collect apples from gardens, and we had many donations at the collection point at the Community Centre. Thanks also to Chris Simpson, who allowed us to store the fruit in one of his barns.

In the end, we had somewhere in the order of a tonne and a half to press on the 16th October at Codrington Cider. It was hard work moving and preparing all those apples. After sorting them, we pulped them to produce the "pomace". Next the "cheeses" were made by wrapping the pomace in cloth. The cheeses are then put into the press in layers. All together we produced 160 gallons of juice!

Under the expert eye of Nik Milo (head brewer at Cotswold Spring Brewery), we hope to produce three ciders: dry, medium and a limited-release elderflower. We're hoping it's ready in time for the Pucklechurch Revel Cider Festival to be held in February 2011 at the Community Centre.

Already people are talking about next year and what we can do to make this a real community event. Ideas range from making our own Pucklechurch cider press to organising an "Apple Day" community event around the pressing with apple-related games and food, such as apple bobbing and toffee apples. However, to do all this we will need volunteers. Watch this space!

Internet access a bit slow? Fibre optic broadband could give you the speed you need for streaming music and videos, gaming, uploading and downloading.

BT has launched a campaign - The Race to Infinity – to decide which smaller exchanges in the UK it should upgrade to "superfast" fibre optic broadband (AKA Infinity) first. Our local exchange (Abson) is eligible and all you have to do to help us get there is cast your vote online. Visit the BT website at www.racetoinfinity.bt.com to cast your vote. Each household gets only one vote.
