Ramblers

This newly formed club is now properly established with its duly elected committee, and is affiliated to the Ramblers' Association, thus benefiting from its periodic publications and its backing in case of any disputes over rights of way. We hope shortly to purchase a few Ordnance Survey maps in the 1:50,000 series covering Gloucestershire and adjacent areas. These together with the Ramblers' Association publications will be available from the secretary for members to borrow. The committee has arranged a programme of walks for the remainder of this year, and these are printed on our membership cards. Information about the next walk can be found displayed in various shop windows in the village. So far, we have explored many of the footpaths within the parish boundary and have travelled further afield on two occasions. The first was an evening walk starting at Wick church and exploring the countryside in that area. Our latest excursion was a walk of some nine miles or so in the Stroud area of the Cotswolds. This was an all day outing, stopping at a convenient pub at lunch time, and returning to Pucklechurch by 6.0 p.m. Some of our members found that the hilly countryside produced some aches and pains next day, but we also have memories of some beautiful views and a day spent in enjoyable company. PUCKLECHURCH MAN TO STAND FOR PARLIAMENT

As you may have read in the rest of the local press recently, Dr. George Conrad has been selected as the Liberal Prospective Parliamentary Candidate for this constituency. George is already well known within the village, particularly for his local activities on the Parish Council, Revel and the Community Association. He was also involved in the setting-up of this newsletter in 1976 (Yes - we have been going that long! - Eds.).

The press reports which have been published have been very brief, and, since George is a local personality, we have sought to obtain the full background for you. After much negotiation, Pucklechurch News managed to obtain an appointment with George and your intrepid reporter travelled to Pucklechurch House to interview him in person.

P. News Why did you decide to become a Liberal?

G. Conrad Because the Liberal Party is the only one that cares about the individual, i.e. you and me. Its policies are determined by ordinary everyday people without favouring either big business or the trade unions. Above all Liberals are honest enough to admit that there are no simple solutions to most problems, but believe that a great deal can be achieved by co-operation, rather than the existing system of confrontation.

P.N. Why do you want to stand for Parliament?

G.C. Because in my job as a family doctor most of the problems I come across

are not medical but social, and require actions by politicians. For example, the lack of facilities for the care of the elderly cannot be cured by a bottle of medicine. Unemployment, inflation and high taxation can only be reduced by effective government in Westminster.

P.N. Do you think you have any chance of being elected?

G.C. In many ways this seems unlikely, but I have been encouraged by the very warm support from many voters. I believe that living and working within the constituency gives me a good start.

P.N. If elected, what do you think you can achieve as a Liberal M.P.?

G.C. The more Liberals there are in Parliament, the more likely it is that we will have a truly representative government. I will press for sensible Liberal policies and prevent the other parties from imposing their dogmatic views. Above all, I will listen to the views of all the constituents, regardless of party, and will try to ensure that these are heard in Parliament. Think of the publicity which would follow the election of a Liberal M.P. for this area - this alone would ensure that our views are heard. The most important thing to me is not simply to be an M.P., but to be your M.P.
