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#### DIRTY DOG MENACE

If Tory MP Tony Marlow and Labour MP Clive Soley succeed, dog owners will have to produce a medical certificate before they can get a dog licence.

What worries them is the disease toxicara canis which can be passed on to humans when pavements or parks (eg Recreation Field) are fouled.

It can attach<sup>to</sup> the lungs, brain and eyes. Estimates are that it is responsible for the sufferings of 30,000 asthma victims and 15,000 epileptics. Some 200 people a year - mostly children are blinded or partly blinded by it.

If half of this damage was caused by nuclear power stations, the streets of London would be jammed with protesters.

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PROFILE - MRS MURIEL BEAMISH

Mrs Muriel Beamish lives at the charming Crump House (built 1624) and has lived in Pucklechurch since 1921.

Mrs Beamish, educated in Peterborough, was uncertain what career to follow. World War I had started. She loved country life and was tempted by attractive posters encouraging girls to work on the land - one in particular showed a girl behind a plough in the early morning with the sun just peeping over the hill. Her family finally relented and allowed her to join the Land Army. She was sent to Longford Castle for training at Lord Radnor's farm - two weeks with cows and two weeks with horses. Learning to milk by hand (there were few milking machines then) was painful at first, and she can still remember the awful pins and needles she suffered until her fingers became used to the unusual strain. Work started at 6am. She enjoyed the work in the dairy and was pleased to get a job on a farm at Winterbourne Gunner near Salisbury with no field work.

She now had smart white Land Army overalls - not very practical - after half an hour and just one swish of a cow's tail they were filthy! The day's work there started at 4.20am! Thirty cows had to be milked by hand by two people before 7am in order to catch the milk train. Mrs Beamish had to take four 17 gallon churns the three to four miles to the station on an old milk float pulled by a pony called 'Polly'. On returning to the farm she fed and watered the pony and then had some breakfast herself. She then had to clean the cow sheds and mix feeds for afternoon milking from 2pm until 4pm. Then off to the station again, returning for some tea at 5.30pm. Supper at 8.30pm and then to bed. What a day! It was hard work but she loved it, apart from the loneliness.

Because of the isolation she decided, after nearly a year, to take two weeks leave (which she spent sleeping!) and to look for another farm. She received a telegram telling her to go at once to a farm near Marlborough in Wiltshire. Her heart sank when she saw it. Her boss was a bad tempered, slave driving man. The one consolation was that she made a friend there, another Land Army girl, and they are friends to this day. Together they transferred to another farm at Mere, where they were happy, but once the hay-making was over they had to move on. After working at another farm in Wiltshire and one in Cornwall, Muriel Beamish saw an advertisement wanting two girls to work on a farm in Pucklechurch!

\* Muriel and friend 'Piny' were offered the job out of about fifty applicants . . . and Muriel met Bernard Beamish . . . a year later they married and lived at Crump House (then a farm), her mother-in-law living at Dennisworth Farm which they had bought from Lord Radnor (coincidence as she had trained at Lord Radnor's farm). They had one daughter and three grandchildren (the grandson now living in America), and her daughter and son-in-law live at Crump House too.

Muriel followed the Wick and District Basset Hounds hare hunting (now Beagles not Bassets), a sport which she now considers cruel, having become anti blood sports. Her husband fox hunted with the Beaufort, and was a founder member of the Wick & District.

They owned a lot of farmland in Pucklechurch - including the land where the Remand Centre is now. Crump House has an acre of garden, so it's as well that Mrs Beamish and her daughter enjoy gardening! Another hobby stemming (!) from gardening is that of dried flower arranging. During the Silver Jubilee celebrations in Pucklechurch in 1977 Mrs Beamish and Mrs Ford (Dennisworth Farm) together made an enormous crown of red, white and blue flowers which was suspended in the porch of the church.

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Footnote: Bar at Star Inn called 'Radnor' - also house in Castle Road 'Radnor House'

There is a very impressive stone fireplace at Crump House which had for some strange reason been plastered over - they were delighted to find it. Each year Jackdaws return to nest in the chimney. It's a charming house, and surprisingly one that I had never seen before, being tucked away behind Homefield Road and off Shortwood Road.

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Parish Council Report (Clerk: Mr R Wiltshire, 36 Hill View, Tel.2872)

Six new trees have now been planted, five on the Children's Play Area between Eagle Crescent and Partridge Road, and one on the recreation field, this tree being in the memory of the late Mr E G Nicholls who served on the Parish Council and the Rural District Council for many years. The play equipment on the play area adjacent to the Industrial Estate will shortly be moved to the new play area and the grass on the new play area will be cut once per week by Northavon District Council.

The Council are considering erecting a post and rail fence alongside the Recreation Field similar to the fence alongside the field at Castle Road. Three new seats and chains will soon be fitted on the swings in the Recreation Field, the seats will be of the new rubber safety type.

The Council regret they have received a further complaint of a dog fouling a lawn on the new estate. These unfortunate incidents continue unabated and the Parish Council again appeal to owners of dogs not to allow their dogs to foul the open grass areas or the childrens play areas.

The Council are considering the question of erecting footpath signs in the Parish for the benefit of Parishioners who wish to use footpaths for country walks, if you know of a footpath which has been blocked in any way please report the matter to the Parish Council - give me a ring on Abson 2872.

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DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Dr George Conrad

In this the year of the disabled, the District Council are running a lottery at the two Sports Centres in order to raise as much money as possible to buy equipment designed especially for use by the disabled in sport. It is hoped that if there is any shortfall in the revenue this will be made up from the rates so that the disabled in Northavon can enjoy the facilities available.

The indoor bowls extension at Thornbury Sports Centre has been completed ahead of schedule and is now in use - so why don't you have a go.

Concessionary Bus Fare Scheme - Northavon is giving £6 worth of tokens this year. With increased bus fares and the rural nature of the District this is really not very generous, especially considering that Kingswood for instance gives £13 to each pensioner. Following a petition from Coalpit Heath the tokens are going to be reviewed next year to see whether more can be done for pensioners. Remember that the tokens can be used to purchase a Railcard or to pay for rail fares - despite their name.

The District Council supported other District Councils in pressing the Government to raise the Dog Licence from 7s6d to £5. At present it costs more for the Government to collect the Dog Licence than the revenue it receives. Further more, they are pressing for the implementation of a Dog Varden Scheme using the money raised from increased Licences to pay them.
