Do you know the Guide Movement is 75 years old this year and has over 7 million members in over 100 countries?

Can you imagine the beginnings in 1910 in Edwardian England when it was unladylike for girls to do anything boisterous. Nevertheless bored young ladies with a sense of adventure, secretly began to read their brothers' weekly "Boy Scout" magazine and form themselves into Patrols. In 1910 Baden-Powell held a rally for Boy Scouts and at the tail end marched a little band of "Girl Scouts". Baden-Powell, at first taken aback, quickly realised the need for a girls movement and asked his sister Agnes to help him; and so the Girl Guides began.

We will obviously be celebrating these 75 years locally and nationally throughout 1985 and already have a commemorative badge to wear on our uniform. A Division party, County rally, County Jubilee Camp and National lighted candle ceremony are already planned.

Locally, however, we'd like to hold a 'party' in the summer and invite anyone who has been connected with the Guide movement at any time over the last 75 years. ## PUCKLECHURCH COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

Here are some questions from an "Anonymous Ignoramus" (!!) concerning the Pucklechurch Community Association.

They have been answered by Geoff Wilcock, Chairman of the PCA

We hope that they will clear up any queries that you might have had.

1. What is/was the role of the Village Hall Management Committee?

Answer

The Village Hall Management Committee was a registered charity which was formed with the object of providing facilities to improve the conditions for social and recreational facilities in the village.

2. What was the proposed role of the PCA when it was established?

Answer

The Pucklechurch Community Association is also a registered charity, which was formed in 1977 to "Improve the conditions of Life in the Parish of Pucklechurch by bringing together local authorities, organisations and individuals in order to advance education and provide facilities in the interests of social, welfare, recreation and leisure time occupation and to establish or secure a community centre.

3. What is the relationship between these two bodies now?

Answer

The two charities became one by merging under the PCA Constitution on 9th October 1984.

4. Who was responsible for the building of the Village Hall? Who owns it?

Answer

The VHM built it. The Official Custodian for Charities owns it on behalf of the PCA.

5. Who owns and is responsible for the "Rec"?

Answer The Parish Council

6. Does the CA run the Social Club?

Answer

No. The Social Club is run independently by a committee elected from its members. It is a private members club. Membership is open to all members of the PCA over 18 years of age.

7. Does the CA have overall control of Revel?

Answer

NO. Revel is totally independent and is run by a committee elected from parishioners at its annual general meeting each September.

8. Where does CA funding come from?

Answer

Subscriptions and fund raising events, and with effect from 1 January 1985, the lettings of the Village Hall.

9. Who can hire the Village Hall and how much does it cost?

Answer

Anyone can apply to hire the Village Hall. The charges are displayed on the notice board inside the main entrance. The Booking Clerk is Mrs M Whittock, 14 Lansdown Rd (2090).

# PUCKLECHURCH PARISH COUNCIL

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The new equipment shed has now been erected together with new concrete steps to the Recreation Field. A concrete path will be laid to the new shed in the Spring and the entrance steps to the Scout Hut will be renewed. The area adjacent to the Shopping Precinct has been landscaped and is a big improvement.

Negotiations are taking place between the Parish Council and the Education Authorities for the possible use of the old school building - which is now disused - for supervised Youth Club activities.

Mr Harley has now retired from his duties as Post Master, and a gift of a fishing rod and reel has been presented to Mr Harley in recognition of his past services to the Parish.

The old village hall will be taken down in the near future and the area will eventually be tidied up and landscaped.

## **NORTHAVON DISTRICT COUNCIL** Dr G Conrad

DOGS - you may be interested to know that in a recent report to Councillors it has emerged that dogs should be kept on leads when on the following roads in the Parish of Pucklechurch: Abson Road (part), Oaktree Avenue, Maple Walk, Birch Drive, Cedar Way, Holly Close, Hawkridge Drive, Hawthorn Close, Kestrel Drive, Merlin Ridge, Woodpecker Crescent, Partridge Road, Goldfinch Way and part of Homefield Road! Orders were made under the 1972 Road Traffic Act by the former Sodbury Rural District Council and are still in force. It is therefore illegal to have dogs running around without a lead on these roads!

Prefabricated Houses - There are a number of houses in the village built from prefabricated reinforced concrete. Most of these were built by the local authority many years ago, and some have now been bought by council tenants. In a few such houses around the country faults have been discovered which need repairing if the houses are going to last for many more years. Northavon have inspected ALL the houses that they own and have not found any that are unsafe, however, the Government has passed the "Housing Defects Act 1984" which obliges the Council to either pay for 90% of the cost of repairs or to repurchase the property. If you have bought such a house from the Council in the last 5 years, contact the Department of Environmental Health at Northavon District Council on Chipping Sodbury 313501. They will be able to give you more details.

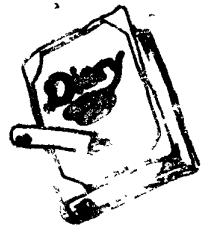
Travel Tokens - over the next 3 months the Council will be considering how much to spend next year - that is how much your rates will be! One of the items which comes up every year is the Concessionary Travel Tokens which are issued to pensioners to use on buses, taxis or to buy a British Rail Card (which entitles you to 50% travel on trains). Northavon has not increased the value of the Tokens for many years and the value still stands at £6 per person per year. In Kingswood the tokens are worth £18 so there is a discrepancy of £12 between the two authorities. I would like to see the Northavon Tokens increased to £10 which would start to give pensioners especially in rural areas like Northavon a slightly better deal.

CYCLING - Northavon District are going to buy the disused railway line from Shortwood towards Yate and probably make it a cycleway, as well as a pedestrian walk. If the County decides to build the Ring Road along the railway, they have undertaken to provide a cycleway along its length, so at least cyclists will not be expected to mix with fast moving traffic.
