#### PARISH COUNCIL

The roundabouts at Eagle Crescent and the Recreation Field were both being dismantled for winter maintenance and would be replaced again in the Spring, it had also been decided to remove the climbing bars and base from the Recreation Field and reseed the area - they would not be erected again as they were very seldom used. A new swing would be erected at Shortwood in the Spring. The walls on the underpass on the new estate had been repainted, Northavon DC had supplied the materials - it is hoped to get the railings painted.

The Council is compiling a list of trees around the village which they consider should be given a protection order, the list would be sent to the Planning Authority for consideration. A letter would be sent to the County requesting an inspection be made of various bad paths on the new estate and around the village in general with a view to getting the paths repaired. The Council is considering various types of paths which would be suitable for the Burial Ground in relation to costs, and a decision would be made in the near future.

BUS SERVICE

Following a request for a later bus to the village from Bristol, the Council was informed that there was no hope of a later service as it was shown in past records that such a service was poorly supported and was economically unsound. The Parish Council has also been informed that under the Transport Act 1985 Badgerline have not registered a link to Parkfield as part of its commercially viable network from October 26th, but the County of Avon has issued a tender to cover school journeys and a shopping service from Parkfield, and the Parish Council understands that final decisions on tenders will be made shortly in the light of quotations received and resources available for supporting services.

The Parish Council was saddened by the death of Harry Sherman. Harry served 33 years unbroken service as a member of the Parish Council. This is a record in the history of the Parish. Harry also served on the District Council for many years. He was well liked and respected by all who knew him.

#### CANCER RESEARCH CAMPAIGN





#### SUMMER HOLIDAYS PLAYSCHEME



#### DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - George Conrad

"Paying for local services" - Northavon District Council has been discussing the Government's discussion paper on how to abolish Rates and what to replace them with. Nobody likes paying rates, and yet we all need the local services that they provide. We need our dustbins to be emptied, we want our children to be educated, and we want to be sure that a fire engine or policeman will turn up on our doorsteps when needed.

Rates are a tax on property and there is no doubt that they are unfair. A single elderly person pays the same rates as a family of four wage earners for instance. The Government proposes to introduce a "community charge" that is everyone over 18 will be liable to pay a charge to the local District Council. Many people have called this a "poll Tax" - because although a separate register will be created, it will obviously duplicate the present electoral roll. Businesses also pay rates, and there will be a national rate for them set by Central Government.

The present proposals would mean that every man and woman over the age of 18 living in Northavon would have to pay about £217 community charge EACH. This would only cover about 25% of the costs of Local Authorities and the remaining 75% would be funded by Central Government. I think that that will mean more Whitehall control over what local authorities do and is just as unfair as the present system. What would happen if your 19 year old son did not pay his "Community Charge"? Would the baliffs come and take your TV or would they try and identify what was owned by him? It is a nightmare.

I believe that a much fairer way of raising money for local services is to levy a local income tax. People would then pay according to their means rather than where they lived.

Pavements - the tarmac footpaths on the estate are a disgrace and in places very dangerous. Pavements in Homefield Road are also very uneven. I and the Parish Council have written to the County Council and they have promised to come and have a look at all the pavements in Pucklechurch. They will rectify anything that is actually dangerous immediately, but hopefully they will put all the footpaths into their programme and bring them up to a reasonable standard.



#### SUMMER HOLIDAYS PLAYSCHEME

Playscheme. Pucklechurch children have been making the most of their summer holidays thanks to the efforts of a group of volunteers in the village. For the second year running, local mums and other helpers have organised a holiday playscheme, based on the village hall and recreation field, for the 5-11 year olds. The scheme has weekday morning since August 4 and has been a big hit with the youngsters, catering for up to 100 daily. "It has been another out-standing success" said one of the mums, Mrs. Beverly Stewart, joint play leader with Mrs. Pauline Taylor, a supply teacher at the school. "The children can't wait to join in and they are queuing up to go into the village hall at 9.30 a.m. each morning when I ar-rive". The scheme has been granted-aided by Northavon District Council and Puckle-church Parish Council, extra funds having been raised by the organisers themselves at a jumble sale. It is run on a rota system with six mums in attendance daily while Guides and other vol-unteers also help. An added attraction for the children on Friday was the fairground roundabout which was so popular at the village Revel Day in June. There was an outing yesterday by coach to Bowood House, near Caine to enjoy the adventure playground. The playscheme ends to-day with a Punch and Judy show.
