Apparently there will be a New Year's Disco at the Village Hall this year - organised by the PCA & Social Club . . .

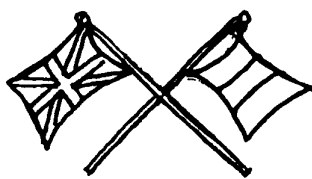


PUCKLECHURCH TWINNING ASSOCIATION

REPORT ON THE VISIT OF PUCKLECHURCH TO PRINQY 10th-11th SEPT. 89.

On Friday 9th September 57 people set out from Pucklechurch by coach to attend the official twinning ceremony in Prinçy. Ten others travelled by car. The coach was met north of Paris by representatives of the Prinçy Jumelage and escorted to Prinçy. A short stop was made to enable everyone to decorate the coach in red, white and blue. Our arrival was greeted by the hooting of horns. It was 8.00am but no one seemed to mind the noise. Breakfast of coffee and croissants was laid on in the Foyer Rural, after which people departed with their hosts for a busy morning. Everyone met again in the Foyer rural for a buffet meal. During this there was a skit on a typical Englishman (bowler hat and city suit) and typical Frenchman (beret etc). The children disappeared at intervals to the fair which was held just outside. After the buffet everyone walked to the Mairie where the signing of the charter and exchanging of official gifts took place. A champagne reception followed. A display of folk dancing was then given by La Ballinaise. After dinner with their hosts everyone congregated in the park for a Jazz Concert followed by a magnificent firework display to music. This was followed by a concert by the local "Hurling Horns" outside the Mairie. Then it was back to the Foyer Rural for a party where everyone danced to English and French music forgetting that they had not slept the night before.

Everyone was up early the following morning and on the RN7 for the unveiling of the road sign. The band played the English and French National Anthems and then led a procession of flags to the War Memorial for a service of remembrance. The Union Jacks were carried by two Girl Guides and wreaths laid by French and English representatives. The fête of the Black Virgin is held during this weekend in Prinçy and a procession headed by a statue of the Black Virgin wound its way through the village to the Park where a celebration Mass was held. After dinner the bike race was started by an English official dressed for the part. At 4pm everyone congregated to bid au revoir and to board the coach for Calais and home. We had a most enjoyable weekend meeting old friends and making many new ones.

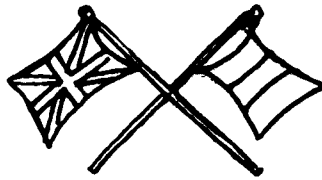

PUCKLECHURCH TWINNING ASSOCIATION

REPORT ON THE VISIT OF PRINGY TO PUCKLECHURCH 18th-19th JUNE 1988

The people of Pucklechurch gathered in warm sunshine outside the Community Association at 9:30am on Sat. June the 18th to greet a party of 51 from the village of Pringy. The coach arrived with much cheering and waving of flags. After renewing many acquaintances the French guests were introduced to their hosts, and after a short welcome by Rene Boyeldieu they were taken to their hosts homes. Everyone met again at 1:00pm to watch and enjoy the 1988 Pucklechurch Revel procession which was Judged by Monsieur Lamarche and Madame Labile. The theme of the parade was France and England and the winner turned out to be the Cafe Rene entered by the Cubs. The afternoon was then spent on the Recreation field enjoying the Pucklechurch Revel including the Pucklechurch Majorettes, the Cumberland Giants, the Goat Show and of course a typical English cream tea. The weather was superb and the afternoon thoroughly enjoyed by all. Some of the hosts managed a quick trip into Bath or the surrounding countryside. In the Evening we were all invited to the Revel Barn dance and what an experience! Many English find it difficult but great fun, our French guests were amazed but in a short time were joining in and having a go although not always understanding what the caller intended them to do. The whole evening turned out to be a wonderful success.

Sunday morning everyone was up bright and early for the Twinning Church Service at St. Thomas a Becket. Our guest of honour the Duchess of Beaufort was introduced to the officials of both Pucklechurch Twinning Association and the Euro-Pringy Committee. During the special service wreaths were laid in remembrance of those who gave their lives in the two world wars. Children from the local primary school read Twinning prayers and the lessons were read in both English and French. The children of the Junior Church sang a French song and also "He's got the whole world in his hands".

Official photographs were taken outside the church in bright sunshine and we then walked to nearby Feltham Road where a road sign was unveiled by the Duchess together with two young helpers one English and one French

At 12:30 everyone gathered in the Community Centre for a celebration meal. In all 159 people sat down together in a beautifully decorated hall to mark this important occasion in the lives of the two villages. Speeches were made at the end of the meal by Geoff. Wilcock Chairman of Pucklechurch Parish Council, Trevor Trueman President of the P.C.A. Michel Cerisier Deputy Mayor of Pringy and Madame Lecuyer President of Euro-Pringy. The toast to the future friendship of our two villages was proposed by Nancy Cleavelly Chairman of Pucklechurch Twinning Association. Gifts were exchanged and a celebration cake was cut by Nancy and Janine.

Our French guest departed at 6:30pm having formed many new friendships and leaving the villagers of Pucklechurch looking forward to a re-union in Sept.



This year, Pucklechurch was the scene of much activity preparing for the twinning ceremony with the town of Pringy, and the events of Revel were an obvious attraction for our French guests whose visit was planned to coincide with Revel Day itself. Once again we managed to stage a series of successful events which brought fun and enjoyment to all those who were able to attend.

The future of the Beer Festival seemed in some doubt without its venue at Pucklechurch House, the only alternative venue being the Recreation Field which the committee felt warranted additional expenditure on security. This together with lower attendances (and consumption!) at the Beer Festival and the extended hire of the marquee etc to stage the Revel/Twinning Folk Dance reduced the surplus for the year. Contributions from Revel Day stalls saw a change in that individual groups were invited to take of the profits from their stall.

Whilst the 1988 Revel has not produced the funds we have become accustomed to expect, the efforts of all those involved should, I believe be judged by the continued success of what has become the focal event of summer in Pucklechurch.

LETTER



It has come to my notice recently that, mingled with the residential homes on the main estate in Pucklechurch are several large lorries and articulated vehicles parked. Fortunately I don't have to view them very often, but I am wondering if the people who do, enjoy the experience very much? Do they really enhance the look of the village in general? I very much doubt if anyone would say YES If the people who are forced to stare at the sides of lorries, or have their rooms darkened by their image think they can do nothing about it, or don't know what they can do, then let me give you the following information:

Since June 1984 a new Operators Licensing system was implemented which strengthens the powers of Licensing Authorities to consider the environmental suitability of Operating Centres (where the vehicles are operated from and should return to). Firstly, most goods vehicles with a gross plated weight of over 3.5 tonnes must have an Operators Licence by law. To obtain this licence there are many rules and regulations to be strictly adhered to - one of them being that the Operating Centre is environmentally suitable. Now, either the owners of the parked vehicles around Pucklechurch are in possession of an Operators Licence which states that the Operating Centre is "Where they normally park their vehicles in Pucklechurch", which I think is very unlikely, or the drivers of the vehicles park them in the village because it is convenient to them and they obviously don't care what they look like to other people. The address below is where information can be sought and complaints made if anyone feels they want to. Remember to give as much information as possible, namely registration number of vehicle, type of vehicle, when and where parked, and the owner of the vehicle if possible. The Department of Transport will then make an investigation.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Marilyn Palmer

First of all, the results of the National Radon Survey that you've all been waiting for with bated breath! 25 houses in Northavon were surveyed between November 1997 and May 1998. The average level in Northavon was 47 becquerels per cubic metre of air, compared with a national average of 22. Two houses in Northavon had very high readings - one was 15 times the national average, and another 6 times, and these will be monitored further. My home however, gave a reading of 47 Bqm-3 - the Northavon average, and twice the National average. This is well below the level at which further action is needed.

THE HOUSING BILL - This is the subject of much discussion at the moment. Northavon owns 5,500 Council houses and under the Housing Bill a private landlord can make bids to purchase them. I will shortly be distributing a leaflet to all council house tenants to explain the situation further. Northavon D.C. has commissioned a large firm of accountants (Coopers & Lybrand) to advise them and they are awaiting their report. The same firm has advised other councils to sell all of their housing off to a Housing Association BEFORE the Bill becomes law. Northavon D.C. has already set up a Housing Association just in case they decide to do this. Councils who have sold their houses to a Housing Association argue that it is better than waiting for a private landlord to come along. Personally, I think that the Council is a good landlord - it is not motivated by profit - those in need get priority, not those who can pay. I will keep you informed of the decision that Northavon makes.

HIPPIES (Batchford Lane)

I'm sure you must all be aware that we have had various travellers staying in Batchford Lane, the slip road off Westerleigh Road, for about a year now, in varying numbers. Well, in about April the County of Avon (as the owners of the land) served notices to quit on the hippies, who then sought a judicial review as they were not satisfied about the validity of the notices to quit. Since then nothing could be done until a decision had been made in the courts. Well, at last there is a date for the hearing - 12 December at St Mary's Court in London. The case is expected to take three days. If the County lose, they will appeal.

P.R.C. HOMES

I have finally been promised a meeting between officers of Northavon D.C. and the tenants of Poplar Drive and Homefield Road. No date has yet been fixed, but it should be in the near future. I hope that tenants will find reassurance from this meeting. Plans for the redevelopment of PRC homes are dependent on the success of a Pilot Scheme at Patchway which has made very slow progress. The scheme is dependent on the cooperation of tenants, and we have been insisting that tenants should be consulted fully at every stage.

SOUTH BEAUFORT YOUNG FARMERS

The South Beaufort Young Farmers held their AGM on Tuesday 11th October when they elected their new Chairman - Miss M Isaacs, Vice Chairman - Mr N Symms, and the Secretary - Miss T Goaman.

The first meeting of the year was on 18th October which took the form of a beetle drive. On Thursday 20th October South Beaufort lost at a skittles against Berkeley Young Farmers - although it was a very close game.

Sunday 23rd October - It's a Knock Out at Badminton House, by kind permission of His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, proved to be most rewarding when we succeeded in winning for Northavon.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 15th November when we will have a talk from Allied Dunbar. The Young Farmers welcome any new members between the ages of 12 and 26 years old at Doynton Village Hall on Tuesdays at 7.30pm. So please come along and see how we do it in wellies!
