Pucklechurch Parish Council Chairman's Report – Spring 2015

Annual Parish Meeting

The Chairman gives formal notice that the Annual Parish Meeting will be taking place on 22 April 2015 in the School Hall at Castle Road. The agenda will be circulated nearer the time.

Burial Ground

The Burial Ground is now full and closed to interments other than those which can be accommodated in plots that have been previously purchased, burials resulting from the reopening of family plots and the interment of ashes. There are currently no plans to provide more facilities in Pucklechurch.

Water at Policeman's Corner, Shortwood Road

Despite our best efforts to get this problem resolved by the relevant authorities this continues to be an issue. The water authority and South Gloucestershire Council have fixed leaks and cleared drains but water continues to flow onto the road. We will continue to report the excess water and would suggest that individual residents report the issue, to support our efforts, directly to South Gloucestershire Council's Highways and Street Scene Services – telephone 01454 868000

Obstructive Parking

Concerns have been raised about cars parked in such a way that might cause an obstruction to emergency vehicles. Please could I ask that all drivers consider this when parking and any residents who believe the 'parking to be an immediate significant obstruction and / or is placing other road users in danger then call 999 for assistance'. This advice has been taken from the Avon and Somerset Constabulary website.

Defibrillators

You are no doubt aware that there has been a spate of defibrillator thefts in the Bristol area, including two from Pucklechurch. The publicity around this led to me being invited to talk about it twice on Radio Bristol. After hearing about our thefts, Mr Simon Hoddinott, a Wick resident, offered to donate £500 towards a replacement defibrillator in Pucklechurch, and then suggested that he would double this to £1000 should the station play 'Are you lonesome tonight' by Elvis Presley. The presenters and I all said that we would sing it ourselves!

So the radio played the song and Mr Hoddinott made good his promise. It was then suggested that members of the Parish Council should both sing and record the song at a PVSSC Open Mike session. Thus 'Bobby & the Defibs' was formed from a variety of local bands and performers. These included Les, Tom, Chris, Andy plus the horns and keys from 'Up The Function', and vocals provided by several Parish Councillors, who then performed in front of a live audience. Look out on YouTube for the recording. Special thanks go to Mr Hoddinott and all those who took part in the song.

We have now purchased replacement defibrillators for the bakery and Community Centre, and will be increasing coverage in the parish by installing extra equipment in Eagle Crescent and Shortwood. All of our defibrillators will be provided with improved security measures. We are currently evaluating the practicality of placing one at Parkfield.

Policies & Group Contact list

A number of new policies governing the work of the Council have been agreed and others updated, these will shortly be available on our website; <u>http://</u><u>pucklechurchparishcouncil.weebly.com/</u>. However, in order for us to be able to communicate more effectively with community groups we need to update our email list. Please will all groups in the parish provide contact details to the clerk via email at <u>parish.council@pucklechurch.org</u>. We are happy to add interested individuals to this list too if you also supply us with contact details.

The Big Pull

After three years of very poor turnouts we have decided not to arrange an annual spring clean and will concentrate our efforts on a new South Gloucestershire Council initiative - 'The Big Pull'. This is being organised as part of the Wild4life project and involves the Avon Invasive Weeds Forum. Himalayan Balsam is a plant which is rapidly spreading across the UK, invading the banks of our rivers and streams, smothering our native plants and causing flooding. Pulling it up is the easiest way to control it.

Last year's campaign was very successful, with 106 volunteers helping to clear a 675m stretch along the River Frome. We will provide the equipment and guidance, you provide the pulling power. We'll provide news on the dates of Big Pull mornings at a later date.

Parish Council elections will take place at the same time as the General and District Council elections planned for May 2015. The role of a Parish Councillor can be a very rewarding so have you thought about standing? At the February meeting, Graham Nicolls gave a really interesting talk on 'Photography in the Garden'. Here's an example of his work.

Graham's top tips include;

- Using a tripod to keep the camera as steady as possible, with either a hand-held remote shutter or using the camera's own timer delay
- Arranging the flower using stick and pegs to get the right angle in front of a background canvas, emphasizing the features of the flower;
- Spraying the flower with water as the water droplets can accentuate the colours;
- Shading yellow flowers when photographing to achieve more depth of colour.

Have you received a call offering to change your council tax band?

South Gloucestershire Council Trading Standards is warning residents to be on their guard against companies who claim they can move you to a lower Council Tax band or get you a refund.

Officers in South Gloucestershire have received reports of residents in the area receiving unsolicited telephone calls advising them that they are in the wrong council tax band and, as a result, have been paying too much council tax. One caller claimed to be working with the local council.

In a previous but similar scam, residents received unsolicited telephone calls offering to arrange for a representative to visit the property to discuss potential council tax re-banding and refunds.

Typically this kind of company will charge an 'upfront' fee (or retain a percentage of any refund paid) to residents for providing this service. Charges may also be applied even when the appeal is unsuccessful.

It is also possible that a review of a property's Council Tax banding could result in it being moved to a higher tax band.

It is not illegal for a firm to charge a fee for making an application on your behalf to check your Council Tax banding is correct – but residents can do this themselves for free.

Anyone can check if they are in the correct band, or apply to have their Council Tax band reviewed, free of charge, by contacting the local Valuation Office Agency on 03000 501501 or visiting their website, <u>www.voa.gov.uk</u>

The VOA also produce a handy leaflet entitled, "What to do if you disagree with your council tax banding", which is available on their website.

It could save the life of a family member, a friend or even a complete stranger

Did you know that there are several defibrillators located around the village – do you know where they are? How would you get to one in an emergency?

Did you know that you can use them without any training?

Simple to use

In the event of a medical emergency call 999 and ask for 'ambulance'

They are simple and safe. The machine gives clear spoken instructions. You don't need training to use one.

Once in position, the defibrillator detects the heart's rhythm. It won't deliver a shock unless one is needed.

Every second counts

In the event of a medical emergency call 999 and ask for 'ambulance'

After a cardiac arrest, every minute without CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and defibrillation reduces someone's chance of survival by 10 per cent.

When you call 999, the ambulance service will know the locations of our defibrillators. They will tell you to get one if necessary. Do you know where your nearest one is? How would you get there?

Don't delay or interrupt chest compressions to get it, send someone else if you can.

The ambulance service will also dispatch an ambulance to help and possibly a local First Responder. They will also stay on the line to help if needed.

The ambulance service will give you the access code

Return to the patient with the defibrillator.

If instructed by the ambulance service open the defibrillator – it will tell you what to do

How to use a defibrillator

In the event of a medical emergency call 999 and ask for 'ambulance'

Defibrillators are very easy to use. Although they don't all look the same, they all function in broadly the same way. If you're on your own, don't interrupt the CPR to go and get a defibrillator unless instructed to do so. When you can, send someone else to find one. Once the defibrillator is open, all you have to do is follow the spoken instructions.

REMEMBER

1. In the event of a medical emergency call 999 and ask for 'ambulance'

2. You can already use the defibrillators located around the Parish. YOU DON'T NEED TRAINING

3. If you don't know the location of your nearest defibrillator or how you would get there find out now. Don't leave it until there is an emergency

Pucklechurch Community Association Report

February 2015

The heating system has been replaced. John James did a wonderful job keeping the old one running for so long, but the new one is much more efficient. Hopefully this will be reflected in lower energy bills.

As we mentioned in the last issue of Pucklechurch News, several long-standing members of the PCA committee are standing down. No volunteers have come forward to replace them and the committee are now concerned about the future of the Community Centre. An Extraordinary General Meeting was called in January to discuss the situation, with the aim of avoiding a crisis at the AGM in May. The meeting was well attended, but it would have been nice to have seen younger villagers and heard their views.

The current chairman, Alan Holder, reminded the meeting of the improvements to the building that have been carried out. The list is long and has moved the building from being in a position of mainly crisis management to one where it will now be possible to plan ahead.

He went on to suggest a change in the structure of the committee and the responsibilities of some committee members. This was with a view to improve the efficiency of the committee. At any time the new committee could change these roles as they are open to negotiation.

Could you tackle one of these roles?

Chair; Chair monthly meetings, liaise with secretary, monitor projects and any new ideas, liaise with Football, cricket and social club and apply for grants.

Vice Chair; Deputise for chair, deal with all aspects of health and safety, submit annual report to Charity Commission, monitor 'Community Matters' to help the running of building and seek out grants.

Secretary; Draw up agenda, produce the minutes, file minutes, remind committee of meetings, keep committee members informed and deal with correspondence.

Treasurer; Receive money and cheques from Booking Secretary, bank money, organise payments and monitor all bills to ensure good value.

Community Manager; Liaise and involve the local community, create and promote regular events, promote the centre, raise the profile of the PCA and raise funds.

Booking Secretary; Keep the diary, receive bookings and deal with necessary enquiries and paperwork, update website, ensure hirers have all they need, create and send out monthly invoices, check payments, arrange for centre to be cleaned after parties and pass cheques to treasurer.

Maintenance Manager; First point of contact for any problems, contact contractors to do any repairs, arrange for workmen to gain access, monitor heating, check safety of chairs, tables, fire exits etc, and check PAT testing, gas safety certificate emergency lighting etc.
