Pucklechurch Parish Council Chairman's Report January 2014

HMP Ashfield

The Liaison Group has continued to meet throughout the year. However, having addressed the concerns of parishioners, its members feel there is no further value in meeting on such a regular basis. As a result the group has now agreed to meet on a "needs only" basis. I would like to thank all group members who, along with our District Councillors and Prison Managers, gave their time to ensure that the transition was as smooth as could be expected.

Youth Club

The Youth Club now has an independent management committee which will endeavour to ensure the club's longevity and the acquisition of funds to support it. Importantly this means that the club is no longer managed by the Parish Council. I'd like to express thanks on behalf of the Council to those who have volunteered to take on this responsibility and thereby making sure of the continued provision of a youth club in the parish.

Community Car Scheme

As you may recall the Council was successful in securing grant funding from Kings Forest Area Forum to facilitate the start-up of a community car scheme. Unfortunately, despite our best efforts we have been unable to attract volunteers to organise and support its provision. We have therefore informed Kings Forest that we will not be pursuing this project and the grant will therefore be cancelled.

Parish Grant Scheme

I am very pleased to report that the Council was able to make funds available to several organisations after receiving a number of successful grant applications. Please note that the closing date for the next round is the 31st March 2014. The successful applicants and sums awarded were as follows:

Citizens Advice Bureau

£500 to support its work within our local community (subject to confirmation of conditions specified by PPC)

St Thomas a Becket Church

£1000 towards the cost of repairing the weather vane

Victim Support

£140 to support its work within our local community

Pucklechurch Community Centre Social Club

£700 to replace a broken drinks refrigerator and the re-upholstery of seats

Pucklechurch Playgroup

£500 for the provision of outdoor play equipment and its storage

Cycle Path from Pucklechurch to Shortwood

Progress is being made by SGC on a mixed use path that will link Pucklechurch to Shortwood. Some of you may have seen surveyors from SGC along Shortwood Road a few weeks ago. Surveying the topography and trees in the area is the first step for engineers to assess the feasibility of various options. As soon as this has been done there will be public consultation. At this time we are expecting that, following the public consultation, work will start in the 2014/15 financial year and may be carried out in phases depending on funding.

Annual Parish Meeting – Save the Date!

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Wednesday 14th May 2014. As always, all parishioners are invited to attend this meeting and details of topics and its format will be posted nearer the time.

Earlier in the year the Parish Council commissioned an artist to produce an original limited edition lino print to be given as a civic gift in honour the 25th anniversary of our twinning with Pringy. The remaining copies of the print run, entitled 'Pucelancyrca - Pucklechurch' by Melanie Wickham, are available for sale at the price of £35 each (unframed).



These will be sold on a first come, first served basis to a maximum run of 50 copies. The image is a stylised representation of Pucklechurch Parish and reflects many aspects of its community history as well as its Anglo Saxon origins. Melanie has also very kindly offered to license the use of a digital copy of the image to Pucklechurch community groups to use for their own purposes at low cost (£25).

SOUTH GLOUCESTERSHIRE SHOW & NATIONAL ANGLING COMPETITION

The first South Gloucestershire Show will be held at the Windmill Fishery Showground on Saturday 2nd August 2014 and Sunday 3rd August 2014.

Over 10,000 visitors are expected in what will become an annual event and will be a showcase for life and leisure in and around the County. Full details of this event can be found at www.southglosshow.co.uk

To coincide with this event, Windmill Fishery has put up £6,000 as prize money for their first National Angling competition. This will become the annual Windmill Trophy with the finals being fished on the Show days.

England Internationals Des Shipp and Callum Dicks have now entered to compete in the Pairs competition.

The event will be fished for an individual prize of £1500 with £1000 for second and £500 for third places. There will also be a separate Pairs competition with the winning pair receiving £1500 each.

Starjumpers Gym Club

Starjumpers gym club, a British Gymnastics Affiliated club, has been running classes in Pucklechurch Community Centre on Friday afternoons, and once a month on Saturdays, for 10 years.

To celebrate its 10th birthday, Starjumpers gymnasts of all ages, ranging from 5 months in the baby gym classes, to 11 years old in the after school gym classes, took part in a 1 minute sponsored starjump. They raised a magnificent £1400 for the Jessie May Trust, a local children's charity based in Kingswood, offering support to families with children with life limiting conditions.

The children took the fundraising very seriously, with lots of them practising their starjumps at home. As the majority of the children taking part were 3 and under, it meant that lots of the parents were getting involved as well! Even the babies in the "Twinkling Stars" class took part – with the help of mummy or daddy moving the babies legs!

Pucklechurch Community Association

Since becoming the Chair of the Pucklechurch Community Association I have learned a great deal about the running of our Community Centre, and really appreciate the support of the PCA committee. The Community Centre is run by a small group of volunteers on a tight budget to offer the best possible value for the Community and a lot goes on behind the scenes to keep the Centre running on a daily basis – bookings and scheduling, daily maintenance and cleaning, financial management, promotions and awareness, through to small and larger improvements.

One of the areas of improvement we are focussing on is energy efficiency - like low-cost lighting, and renewable energies. This is essential to the general running of the Community Centre as the costs of heating and lighting are going up year on year and we need to keep these costs down so the Community Centre can be sustained within the income generated from bookings (hiring out the Centre to groups and individuals throughout the year). We also hope this will inspire the Pucklechurch Community to recognise more sustainable approaches to energy use. We commissioned an independent energy report (funded by Revel – thank you very much) and have broken the report's recommendations down into different categories – those we can implement ourselves and those we will need specialist expertise and additional funds to pay for. We are now in the process of applying for grants to help with the additional funds required.

The Community Centre is as busy as ever and probably far busier than most people would ever realise. Times keep changing though, so we are extremely keen to draw in and include many more of you (individuals and groups) to ensure we provide a vibrant centre to the Community – something that we would like everyone to be a part of. The Community Centre is your centre and we are very keen that it offers something practical and fun for everyone.

To this end we organised an Open Day back in September so the groups using the Community Centre today could show everyone what they do and can offer. In the last issue of Pucklechurch News we then asked for your feedback in terms of interests you have in the Centre today or what it could offer for you in the future. Thank you for all those who responded. However, sometimes ideas take a while to develop so please provide any feedback to us at any time. You can do this by talking to us, sending any one of us an email (mine is below), or returning the form. You are our motivation, so please don't hold back!

CRICKET

At Pucklechurch Cricket Club we are pleased to encourage men and women, boys and girls to play or just to get involved. In fact, our end of season Tournament on August Bank Holiday Sunday last year, a glorious day in the sun, saw many of the girls and mums getting involved and having a go.

We are a strongly family orientated club with firm beliefs that the whole family should be involved. We arrange BBQs, Discos and fun days when all the family can come along.

Our age groups start from just 6 years old, with Kwik Cricket equipment, a safe way for your child to develop hand to eye co-ordination using all plastic bats, balls, wickets etc. All of our coaches are CRB checked and work under the guidance of the ECB. This age group covers up to Under 9s.

We then progress to U11s, U13s, U15s, U17s and Seniors, running 3 Saturday sides and a Sunday Development side. We are one of a few local clubs who encourage our older youth players to play in their Saturday and Sunday development sides on a regular basis.

Our coaching sessions start shortly. The Youths start on Saturday Morning at Yate International Academy, a fantastic brand new facility, on 22. February from 11am to 1.00pm. Our seniors start at Brimsham Green School, Yate on Wednesday 19 Feb from 6.30 pm to 8.30 pm.

Our Youth Match subscriptions have a cost of £30 per year (no match fees but a charge will be made for teas if playing a senior match) and £10 for year for U9s. This fee includes all training sessions including indoor sessions, and all safety equipment is also included. Unfortunately, we do not take U9s indoors at Yate for safety reasons. Community Oil Buying Scheme

Members of community oil scheme pay lowest prices since July 2012.

You would expect domestic heating oil prices to rise during the early days of January wouldn't you? Members of the West of England Rural Network Community Oil Buying Scheme were pleasantly surprised to see their heating oil bills drop to the lowest level since July 2012! Members who ordered oil at the beginning of January paid just 52.9p per litre, or around £529 for a 1000 litre delivery (plus VAT at 5%). The scheme employs a skilled oil prices negotiator, who watches the worldwide crude oil price, and places the order on behalf of the members at the optimum moment to secure the lowest price.

The community oil buying scheme, run by a local charity, aims to reduce the cost of heating and hot water for people in the West of England who depend on oil. The scheme works by placing a single large order once a month, and negotiating with the all the local suppliers to get the best price.

NEW SCAM CONCERNING FAKE FINES

South Gloucestershire Council Trading Standards would like to warn residents of a new scam that has been reported in other areas of the country and may well occur in this area. Scammers have been extorting money from elderly residents by telling them they are being fined over disposal of waste following building work.

Police are warning elderly and vulnerable people who have had work done on their houses not to be taken in by con-artists who have been going around telling people they are from Trading Standards or the Office of Fair Trading and they are being fined for inappropriate dumping of contaminated waste.

In December, one woman in her mid-80s paid £12,500 to tricksters in a number of bank transfers after she was told she had to pay several fines.

The advice being offered from Trading Standards is do not make payments or reveal bank details to anyone who calls at your door without prior appointment. If you receive a cold call of this nature, please report it to Trading Standards through the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 08454 04 05 06. You can also call the police on 101 or the charity CrimeStoppers on 0800 555 111.
